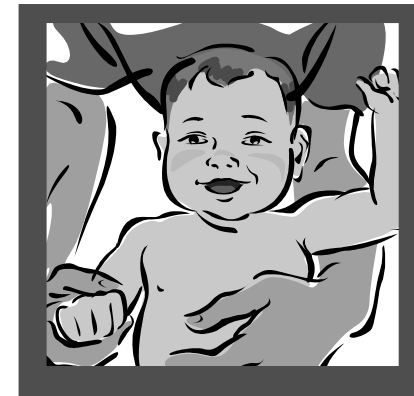


Tickle Rhymes

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Why are songs and rhymes important?

Your baby learns through his or her senses.

Singing and rhyming with your baby are important because so many of his or her senses are being activated.

Your baby:

- **feels** warm and safe
- **hears** your voice
- **sees** your (*most special!*) face.

Your baby learns through repetition.

Singing the same songs, doing the same rhymes and reading the same stories over and over again helps your baby form patterns and understandings about language.

Your baby learns through physical and social interaction.

Playing games that require physical interaction with your baby, like “Peek-a-boo” or tickle rhymes help your baby learn.

Your baby learns by being talked to and by trying to talk to you.

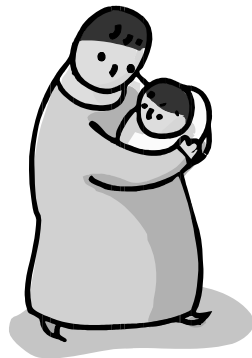
Talking with your baby throughout the day about everything you do will help your baby learn language.

Research shows that knowing songs and rhymes at age three is related to how well a child reads at age six.

Brow Brinky

Lightly tap the parts of your baby's face as you say this rhyme.

Brow brinky,
Eye winky,
Chin choppy,
Cheek cherry,
Mouth merry.



Moses Supposes

Pat your baby's foot as you say the rhyme.

Moses supposes his toeses are roses,
But Moses supposes erroneously:
For nobody's toeses are posies of roses,
As Moses supposes his toeses to be.



Earkin-Hearkin

Earkin-hearkin

Wiggle each of your baby's ears.

Eyekin,-spykin,

Touch beside each eye.

Cheeky-chucky,

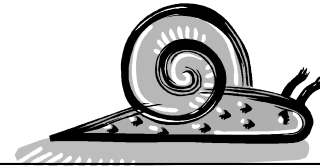
Gently pinch each cheek.

Chin-chin-chin,

Pat under chin.

And down the hatch!

Walk fingers up to your baby's mouth.



Slowly, Slowly, Very Slowly

Slowly creep your fingers up your baby's arm.

Slowly, slowly, very slowly

Up the wooden rail.



Quickly 'jump' your fingers up your baby's arm.

In his little house.

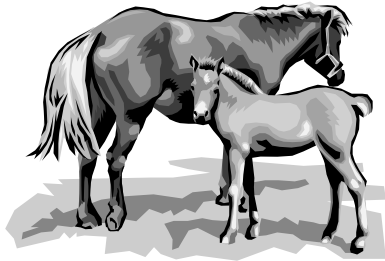
Repeat the same actions for the second verse.

Pat your baby's foot as you say this rhyme.

Pat Your Head

Do the actions with your baby.

Pat your head
And rub your tummy
Tickle your toes
And hug your mummy

The Moon is Round

This is a good rhyme to help when washing your baby's face.

The moon is round,
Gently trace your finger (or face cloth) around your baby's face.
As round can be.
Two eyes,
Lightly touch your baby's eyebrow.
A nose,
Touch your baby's nose.
And a chin,
Touch your baby's chin.
