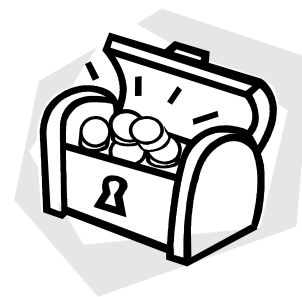


# Treasure Hunt

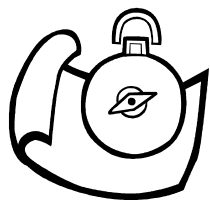
Create a treasure hunt for your child. The treasure can be a small gift such as a toy car, a muffin, a deck of cards, or a box of crayons. Even though the treasure is small, reading the clues and finding the treasure can become a reading adventure your child will want to do over and over again.



Children who can't read can still enjoy the treasure hunt. The clues can be written using some words and pictures which are hand drawn or taken from magazines. Do the treasure hunt with your child so that he or she will learn how it works.

Here is a sample treasure hunt:

- Give the first clue to your child and tell him or her to follow the clues to find a treasure. Here are more sample clues.
- The second clue is hidden on the green chair.
- Wow, you found the second clue. The third clue is in your coat pocket.
- Super, you found the third clue. The fourth clue is under the kitchen table.
- Great, you found the fourth clue. The fifth clue is in your boot, etc. until your child finds the treasure.



Make the treasure hunt only as complicated as your child can manage easily. Help your child as much as necessary. The goal is to have a reading game that is fun, motivating and active.
